

Grantham Then

By Malcolm G Knapp

Malcolm's interesting book 'A Grantham Walk-About' makes even the smallest street seem fascinating. This time we walk with him down Guildhall Street, a route we often drive down in a few seconds oblivious to the changes it's gone through or the history woven around it. Malcolm however is the master at unearthing little historical gems and once again he's done us proud with this minor thoroughfare.

Ask anyone today who knows Grantham reasonably well where the Guildhall is and they'll direct you to St. Peter's Hill and show you the fine façade of that imposing Victorian building. The puzzling thing for many people is why Guildhall Street has that particular name when it's so far away from St. Peter's Hill. This is where history likes to play little tricks on us. If you go for a pint of beer at the "The Goose' (even that's changed; it used be called 'The Goose at the Bank'), you'll be standing where for many years people went to put in or draw out their money, as this building was in fact Barclays Bank. Long before it became a financial business however, this building was once The Guildhall. So now things are beginning to make sense.

Even the name of the street has gone through a few changes. High up on a wall at the west end of Guildhall Street is a street name made of slate; Blue Lane it says. Why Blue you ask? This is to do with the once powerful Manners family. They were Liberals and in those days the colour of the Liberals was blue. The Manners practically owned the entire street in the 1800s, so Blue Lane it became. So influential were the Manners in fact that a great many pubs and other streets were prefixed with 'Blue'; The Blue Bull, Blue Gate and Blue Court to name but three.

Long before then the street was known as Old Shop Lane. Was this because there were a great many old shops on it? Well, there might well have been but that's not the reason. If you are familiar with the phrase 'To be shopped', you'll know that it means to be betrayed to the police and put in gaol. Old Shop Lane therefore was where the town gaol was situated; enough room to detain thirty prisoners. In those days prison was not a cushy number. To keep the prisoners occupied they erected a treadmill in the prison in 1823. Depending on your crime you could spend hours walking inside the treadmill just like a hamster!



When I wrote my book 'A Grantham Walk-About' in 1981, I described Blue Court as follows: 'This unhappy row of late 18th century houses is all that now remains of an 'L' shaped development of eleven houses that curved into a much larger Rowley Court. This was all was altered later to give Guildhall Street its present route'. Today I'm glad to say that it's a thriving set of individual shops with a cafe at the far end. It doesn't look so unhappy now. Even the Knightingales Cafe was once a store for wines and spirits dating back to 1878. A

lot of what I wrote about back then has now been superseded by modern developments and some of the features I described at that time are no more.

Guildhall Street isn't very long, but you'd have to agree, it's got quite a long history attached to it. We're off down Westgate next time where there's more history to explore!

Itching to get rid of shingles





As I write this the following morning I can still say in my primitive Italian head; 'I want', 'my name is', even 'a tea with milk please'. In a strange way this has

gone beyond mere remembrance;



these phrases roll of my tongue just as if I was thinking about how cold and dull it is outside right now. It's very rewarding and satisfying, making me realise that Rosemarie's system is so special. I know too that if I carried this on over a serious length of time my 'oneness' with Italian would blossom. I feel that if I became a long-term student then by this time next year I could have meaningful conversations with other students in my group.

In fact Angela and I were able to have a very simple chat with each other; we greeted each other, said who we were and that it was a pleasure to make each other's acquaintance. Rosemarie as the 'waitress' then came and took our order; Angela had a coffee with sugar but no milk and I had a tea with sugar and milk, then being the polite people we are, we said thank you. This was all done eventually without help from Rosemarie; not bad for an hour's work. Oh yes, we had to work; our brains were never still for a moment. It was however highly enjoyable, satisfying our desire for personal development and giving us a language lesson far better than any I've ever had. Why not try it? 

Here's a question for you. How many people in the UK don't have a Will? Incredibly, it's three out of five would you believe. So many myths and untruths surround Wills and often people believe that a private agreement, lovingly made, will be enough to take care of things when we die. If this were to happen without a Will, your kids would end up in foster care while the courts decide on whom, if anyone is to be their guardian. In a Will you can state who has agreed to take care of them in such a circumstance. Without a Will, money could also be a problem. Make a Will and drive carefully.

If you bought the house as "beneficial joint tenants", the property passes outside your Will and automatically goes to your spouse, in effect disinheriting your children. A safe way to ensure your other children are financially looked after is to own the property as "Tenants in Common" giving both of you an equal share. You can then use your Will to gift your half to whom you choose.

a new character,

Prevention is better than cure By Simon Pell

We all know that aching moment so well; we thrust our car keys into the ignition, give it a twist and hear that pathetic churning noise as the engine fails to start. Often as not we keep trying until the battery dies from the exertion; at which point we curse ourselves for not putting the car in for a service. Little wonder that poor old Basil bashed his car with the branch of a tree on one memorable episode of 'Fawlty Towers'; it can feel like the revenge of the machines when they don't do what they're supposed to.

It's not so easy though to think of our computers as machines in the same way. Neatly encased in their metal boxes they don't appear to have any mechanical aspects to them at all. Why would such an innocent piece of kit need servicing? Well, I'm going to tell you why.

You don't need me to remind you that your PC performs millions of bits of work each second. They're very tiny bits of work I'll grant you, but collectively this effort creates a

great deal of heat. Dust is attracted into the central chip, the hard drive and the rest of the circuitry as well as the small fan which is spinning there to keep cooling air circulating. Usually the main silicon chip has a thin film of gel to dissipate the heat it generates but when a good layer of dust has covered it the heat builds up. Along with a slowdown of the ventilating fan you can sense that your PC is slowing down too. In extreme cases your computer can pack up altogether.

Other kinds of servicing are not so obvious though. Using the motoring metaphor again, just imagine you're on an adventure trip. Naturally you'd take along some jerry cans of spare fuel. In a way you should be doing something similar by saving your data somewhere else. This is something that ought to be done at the end of each day – backing up your data. Cloud storage is best because let's say your house burns down. Any USB memory sticks of backed up data are still going to get destroyed.

Rehearsals require Patience

I love listening to performers in rehearsal. It's my only chance to see a work in progress, so when I was invited to visit the Grantham Operatic Society polishing up the finer points of their production of Gilbert & Sullivan's 'Patience', I knew I was going to be in for a treat. Incredibly, they've been working on this opera since September last year. I'll hold my hands up now and confess to being a G&S fan; however 'Patience' had never really showed up on my radar much before now. Prior to dropping in on the principal players' rehearsals I did a bit of homework to learn more which was just as well. I'll get to that later.

The room contained a single keyboard, an arc of chairs in front of it and a fine bunch of very talented performers. The musical director, Caroline Jones began with a vocal warm up session which I listened to as memories of my chorister days flooded back. It was then time to begin a number, ushered in by the most exquisite piano intro one could hope for. Taking their collective breath as the music settled on the time to sing was four of the 'Rapturous Maidens (Jane Richardson, Helen Gray, Marie Hibbert and Suzanne Webb) with Daniella Bridge as Patience herself. The voices which filled the room sent shivers down my spine: the term 'delightful' doesn't come close to describing it: I was spellbound as Sullivan's score and Gilbert's clever word-play were joined together in the sublime rendition of; 'I cannot tell what this love may be'. Halfway through, as I sat in rapture myself the song stopped abruptly. The musical director had picked up on a few minor but necessary points; breathing, phrasing, even a slight hang up on repeated notes that Sullivan liked to put in but which catch out many a singer. Attentive as ever the brilliant singers resumed, adding these running repairs into their performance. Did it make any difference? You bet it did. What followed sounded to me like pure perfection.

The opera is a Mickey-take on the English 'Aesthetic movement' that prevailed in the 1870 and 80s; when creative people turned their back on the stuffy ways of the artistic establishment and struck

out with prose, poetry and painting which were created as 'Art for Art's Sake'. This phrase forms the title of a 1975 song by 10cc, so it's not surprising therefore that in the era of the sixties and seventies when a resurgence of a similar rebellious movement was in full swing against post war austerity that this period setting works so well. Adam Bishop the director has cleverly reworked the staging of 'Patience' to convey this period when Britain was swinging. although it should be stressed to the purists that the Gilbert & Sullivan music and libretto has been carefully ring-fenced and kept sacrosanct. Nevertheless there will be the sight of the odd miniskirt, kipper tie and a few disco moves on stage to take in. Like most Gilbert & Sullivan operas. there is star-crossed love everywhere. Two diametrically opposed poets; Bunthorne (Stephen Blanchard) and Archibald Grosvenor (Adam Bishop) form the foundation of the piece: the

maidens can't get enough of him. His 'Art for Art's sake' stance however is a sham. The other poet; Archibald Grosvenor is the real deal and is therefore too perfect in the eyes of the central character, the lovely young Patience to fall in love with. The course of true love can never run smooth in a G&S opera and of course the plot is so much more complicated than that. The only way to make sense of it is to come and see the show for yourself; though judging by the rehearsal I saw, you're going to be in for a masterpiece of entertainment.



The Gardener of the Future

I can remember one afternoon in late spring, years ago, mowing my father-in-law's lawn with his hover mower. It was gliding effortlessly over the grass, and, seduced by the sun's warmth and the sound of songbirds heralding the approaching summer, I allowed my concentration to lapse. Suddenly, out of the corner of my eye. I saw a flash of light illuminating the flaying cuttings under the mower which instantly came to a stop. Knowing immediately what had happened I turned the machine over to find that I had indeed sliced through the cable. The next hour was spent fixing it up and changing the fuse.

At LRS these sorts of accidents are a thing of the past, thanks in the main to the quiet revolution in battery technology improvement. Ever since Alessandro Volta came up with a workable battery in 1799 (we owe the term 'volt' to him) the race has been on to reverse the electrochemical process by recharging it so it can be re-used over and over again. The first lead-acid storage battery was invented in 1859 by Gaston Planté and improved upon by Edison using alkaline electrolytes instead of acid as we have in a present-day car battery. These batteries were cumbersome and heavy, so inventors had to find chemicals that could perform this process better whilst being lighter. The pinnacle of this development is the Lithium-Ion battery and it's this technology that makes the equipment at LRS so portable and long performing.

A fully charged-up lawnmower from LRS can keep going for a long time. Besides which it remains light, making the job of cutting the grass a pleasure. With fewer moving parts than a petrol-driven machine there's an improvement in efficiency too. Environmentally it's also a no-brainer to use this kind of 'green' battery power. With cars being powered by



these kinds of batteries it's easy to see that the future for garden maintenance is also going to be based on Lithium-Ion power.

They have in fact designed a wide range of garden machinery each with

a standard power interface so that the same battery becomes interchangeable with each application. With this in mind it's easy to see the effectiveness of such a brilliant system. Chain saws for instance become lighter and easier to get into position at the top of a tree. Likewise, lightweight hedge trimmers allow the user to reach over a wide hedge to make a nice neat job whilst avoiding the kind of arm and shoulder ache that comes from using cumbersome machinery. To give the user as much choice as possible, Atco and Stiga mowers have designed a range of battery packs for their machines each giving out a muscular 80 volts of serious power.

For example their 5 Amp/Hours battery pack gives up to an hour from one single charge and can be reenergised in just 75 minutes, whilst the smaller pack, though giving out 4 Amp/Hours of current takes only

sixty minutes to re-charge. For added convenience and to make the equipment you're working with even lighter Stiga has created a battery harness which is able to carry either the 4.0 Amp/Hour, or the 5.0 Amp/Hour power pack. It's essentially a back pack battery with a power adaptor providing a great deal of safety and comfort to the

As if this is not impressive enough, the design of these machines are state-of-the-art both ergonomically and in the mechanical heart of each piece of equipment. Pay a visit to LRS's showroom and see for yourself. Maybe 2018 is the year you go from petrol to electrical and become a gardener of the future!

From roof tiles to garden styles

Of all the things that rain is good for, one of the unfortunate ones is discovering holes in your roof. Even the tiniest gap in the roof tiles or a split in the chimney flashing is enough to send rainwater cascading into the loft and on to our bedroom ceiling below. During a cloudburst, untold thousands of litres of water pelt down on your house, and if there's the slightest opening it only takes a few dozen litres to do a whole lot of damage.

Making sure that this never happens to you is a master of all kinds of building work, especially when it comes to roofing. His name is Kevin Oakes, and what he doesn't know about the subject isn't worth writing about. After all, if he's not thirty or forty feet up on a roof, he's down on terra firma building a garden wall or laying some decking.

Back to the roofing side of things, Kevin is well able to take a whole roof apart and build a completely new one if needs be. Getting simple repairs done therefore is seemingly straightforward. However Kevin has to be a bit of a Sherlock Holmes to understand the idiosyncrasies of each roof. Sometimes the water isn't getting into the loft space where you'd have expected, so finding the root cause takes a combination of detective work linked with the benefits of many years of roofing experience. Once done though, you can say goodbye to the heap of builders bills you might have had. Caught in time a roof repair can save you a great deal of money in the long

It's easy to see that Kevin's roofing skills are perfectly transferable to a host of other types of building work. Replacing wooden rafters on a roof takes the same skills used in the installation of wooden decking in a garden for example. We covered Kevin putting up some decking back in 2012. That particular job had to take into account a distinct slope in the garden. Since the decking had to be level, Kevin set heavy wooden timber posts where the garden sloped downwards to keep the surface level. He even built some attractive steps so the homeowners
